



MYSTERIOUS MEDIEVAL ANIMALS

Buckley Museum has many interesting pieces of pottery from thousands of years ago including Roman pottery and Medieval tiles. This pottery has been found under the ground so it is often broken with pieces missing and archaeologists have to guess what things are.


Archaeologists find clues about the past by digging in the ground. These special digs are called excavations. It is possible to find pottery, ancient tools, seeds, bones or the remains of buildings.

Can you... Become an archaeologist?

- Imagine you are an archaeologist and you have found this broken tile decoration. The head of the animal has broken off.
- Print or use the template on <u>Activity Sheet 2</u> to draw the animal you think this is.
- You can use an animal you know or create your own mythical creature.
- Write a short story about your animal.

POTTERY DESIGNERS

Buckley Museum is filled with a wide collection of pottery from pieces used in the home such as jugs and bowls, to pottery created as money boxes and novelty decorations.

Can you... Become a pottery designer?

- Use the types of pottery list (below) to choose the type of pottery you want to design.
- Use the templates on Activity Sheet 3 to design your own pots.
- What colour would it be?
- What patterns would it have on it?
- What would it be used for?

Types of pottery

Coarse domestic ware: This type of pottery was used in the 19th and 20th century. It was used in the kitchen, dairy and around the house. This would have included jugs, bowls, basins, colanders and storage vessels. These were made with a lead glaze over the top to make them look red.

Rustic ware: This pottery was designed to look like tree trunks and small clumps of clay were added to make the pot look like it had branches.

Novelty pottery: This type of pottery was popular in the late 1800s. They were usually multi-layered money boxes with chickens on top for decorations or puzzle jugs with detailed designs.


















HORSE DRAWN TRAMS

Once the pottery was made it needed to be transported from the different potteries around the country. It was originally moved using tramways and carts pulled by horses. Later this was replaced by the railway and steam trains.

Can you...

Make your own horse drawn tram?

- Print out <u>Activity Sheet 5</u>.
- Cut out (if you have printed on paper use as templates, draw round the shapes onto card and cut out).
- You will need 12 wheels in total so will need to cut extra circles.
- Decorate your horse and carts.
- Glue your two horse bodies together leaving the legs (This helps your horse stand).
- Fold your carts along the lines including the tabs.
- Glue the tabs and fit the bottom of each of the carts onto the tabs.
- Stick on four wheels to each cart.
- Attach the two reins from the front of the horse to the first cart.
- Use extra strips of paper/card to attach the second cart to the first and then the third cart to the second.


